Music Notes -

Thanksgiving is just around the corner. It's time to rediscover the wonderful recipes that everyone looks forward to eating and finding new recipes that will soon be added to the old ones. But before sitting down to the bountiful harvest, we always give thanks to the had of all households, who created the seasons and provided the food about to be received. Composers and lyricists have contributed many hymns giving thanks to God which can be sung at any time of year. These are the top 4 hymns that are heard especially at Thanksgiving time.

#693 Come, Ye Thankful People, Come

This hymn was first printed in 1844 by Henry Alford, the author, but was revised by someone else in 1861, not to the author's liking. Therefore, he turned around and re-revised it in 1865 and again in 1867. That 1867 version is what we find in our hymnal. The tune's name, St. George's, Windsor, is the name of the church where the person who wrote the tune, George Elvey, was organist for 47 years. He became the organist there when he was only 19. George Elvey was so good, he got the job instead of Samuel Wesley, whose nickname was 'the English Mozart'. FYI: The composer, George Elvey, became "Sir" George in 1871 after being knighted by Queen Victoria.

#870 We Praise You, O God

This hymn's other name is "We Gather Together". It was originally written as a patriotic Dutch tune, voicing their intolerance to their Spanish occupiers who held their lands from 1556 to 1714. The tune is named for its composer, Edward Kremser. It was originally published in a collection in 1877.

#839 Now Thank We All Our God

Martin Rinkart wrote this hymn during the Thirty Years War in Germany. He was living in Eilenburg, which became a walled off city during the war. By the end of the war, he was the only pastor left in the city. Because of the city being walled off, starvation and the plague took its toll, with over 8000 dying in 2 years. Sometimes, he buried 40 or 50 people a day. He even had to bury his wife. He wrote this hymn during that war and it was sung at the Peace of Westphalia, celebrating the end of the war.

#879 For The Beauty of the Earth

Folliott Pierpoint's hymn was originally published in a book of communion hymns in 1867. Even though he was a prolific writer, this is the only hymn he is remembered for.

So before we sit down to that scrumptious meal of turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, gravy and all the 'fixings', we have the opportunity to say thank you to the provider of all things on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving at Our Redeemer Lutheran Church. And you can be sure, these 4 hymns will probably be on the "musical menu!

Lower level is <u>finished</u> and the new Learning Center is open for students.


The Gold Line is progressing which affects our parking lot with construction and also the traffic pattern in the area. Since the east entrance to the lot has been drastically narrowed, consider using the other driveway (to the west of the church) to enter. When the project is complete we will make alterations as necessary to the east entrance.

Several detours are currently in place:

- -The White Bear Ave. bridge over 94 is closed as are the exit and entrance on the north side of 94. -Old Hudson Road between McKnight and Ruth is partially closed. Detours for access to Sun Ray and
- other local businesses are posted.

All of this means a lot of traffic disruption around the church. Sundays should not be bad, but <u>please bring</u> <u>your patience</u>. Conway and 3rd Street should be good alternatives from the East. From the west, exit on Ruth and come back on Old Hudson Road. We are hoping for this part of the project to be completed this fall!
